CS Ruku Visits NYS Gilgil Academy to Assess Readiness for Expanded Youth Recruitment



Cabinet Secretary for Public Service, Human Capital Development, and Special Programmes, Hon. Geoffrey Ruku, has affirmed the government's commitment to scaling up the National Youth Service (NYS) recruitment program, with a bold target of enrolling 100,000 youths annually.

During an impromptu visit to the NYS Paramilitary Training Academy in Gilgil, Nakuru County, CS Ruku assessed the institution's preparedness to implement this ambitious government program. He emphasized that the government is fully committed to expanding the service as a key strategy for youth empowerment and national development.

"There is no turning back. We are determined to train and empower more youths through NYS as part of our broader national development agenda," said Ruku.

The CS inspected ongoing training activities and reviewed the academy's current capacity, which is set to accommodate 40,000 recruits in 2026, the first phase of the planned scale-up.

"This visit was aimed at establishing the readiness of this facility to support the government's strategic plan to increase the number of NYS recruits to over 100,000 annually," he stated.

Ruku announced that plans are already in motion to expand the Gilgil academy's infrastructure ahead of next year's intake to support the increased numbers.

"Ahead of next year, we intend to have the paramilitary academy infrastructure expanded to accommodate the additional recruits," he said.

He lauded the NYS for its pivotal role in nurturing disciplined, service-oriented youth, describing its paramilitary and technical colleges as critical national infrastructure.

"The National Youth Service paramilitary and technical colleges are essential to our nation. They contribute significantly to developing young people grounded in respect, discipline, and commitment to public service and nation-building," he added.

Beyond the infrastructure upgrades, the Cabinet Secretary also revealed ongoing efforts to commercialize NYS operations. In collaboration with NYS and other government departments, the ministry is working to transform the service into a financially self-sustaining institution.

"The commercial wing of NYS will be critical in making the institution financially viable, resilient, and capable of fulfilling its growing mandate," he noted.

The visit underscored the government's unwavering commitment to leveraging NYS as a vehicle for youth empowerment, skills development, and economic transformation. CS Ruku reaffirmed that the government is investing not just in physical infrastructure, but also in the future of Kenya's youth.

Kenya Unveils First Audit Report on Access to Information Act Implementation



The Government of Kenya reached a significant milestone in its commitment to open governance with the launch of the Inaugural Report on Milestones and Challenges in Implementing the Access to Information (ATI) Act, 2016.

The event, held at the Sarova Stanley Hotel, brought together key stakeholders from across government, civil society, development partners, and oversight institutions to reflect on Kenya's progress in promoting the right of access to information as enshrined in the Constitution.

Representing the Principal Secretary State Department for Public Service and Human Capital Development, Dr. Jane Kere Imbunya, was Ms. Catherine Njoroge, the Director of Information and the State Department's designated Access to Information Officer.

This inaugural report marks the first audit of the implementation of the Access to Information Act since its enactment in 2016. It provides a comprehensive overview of the achievements made so far, including the designation of ATI officers across public institutions, development of information-sharing protocols, and progress in digitization.

Importantly, it also highlights persistent gaps, such as capacity constraints, low public awareness, and limited compliance among some institutions, that continue to hinder full realization of the right to information.

The keynote address was delivered by Ms. Judith Pareno, Principal Secretary, State Department for Justice, Human Rights, and Constitutional Affairs, who reiterated the centrality of access to information in Kenya's democratic architecture.

"Transparency and accountability are non-negotiable pillars of good governance. The ATI Act is not only about the release of documents, it's about building trust between government and citizens," said Ms. Pareno.

The forum provided an opportunity for peer learning, experience sharing, and alignment on cross-sectoral strategies to enhance the uptake and institutionalization of access to information across all levels of government.

As a key implementing agency, the State Department for Public Service and Human Capital Development continues to strengthen its internal mechanisms to meet its ATI obligations. This includes mainstreaming information access in service delivery processes, and contributing to policy dialogue through platforms such as this launch.

Looking ahead, stakeholders committed to a collaborative approach in addressing the identified challenges, including review of the ATI regulations, improved resourcing, and embracing digital innovations to enhance public access.

The event was not just a review of progress, but a call to action for all public instutions to renew their commitment to openness, responsiveness, and respect for the public's right to know.

With 58 Huduma Centres already operational across the country, today's launch of the Mogotio Huduma Centre continues to build on the momentum of transforming public service delivery and making it truly people-first.


